Irregular (unusual) plurals in English

To make a singular noun plural, we usually add s or es. For example, one owl, two owls, or one fox, two foxes. However, sometimes other letters change. For example, one man, two MEN. One woman, three WOMEN. Sometimes the word stays the same – one reindeer, seven reindeer; one sheep, twenty sheep.



The important thing to do today is to think about what effect the changes you make have on the way the paper helicopter falls – does it take more time or less time, does it fall in a different way?












Paper Helicopter Template






